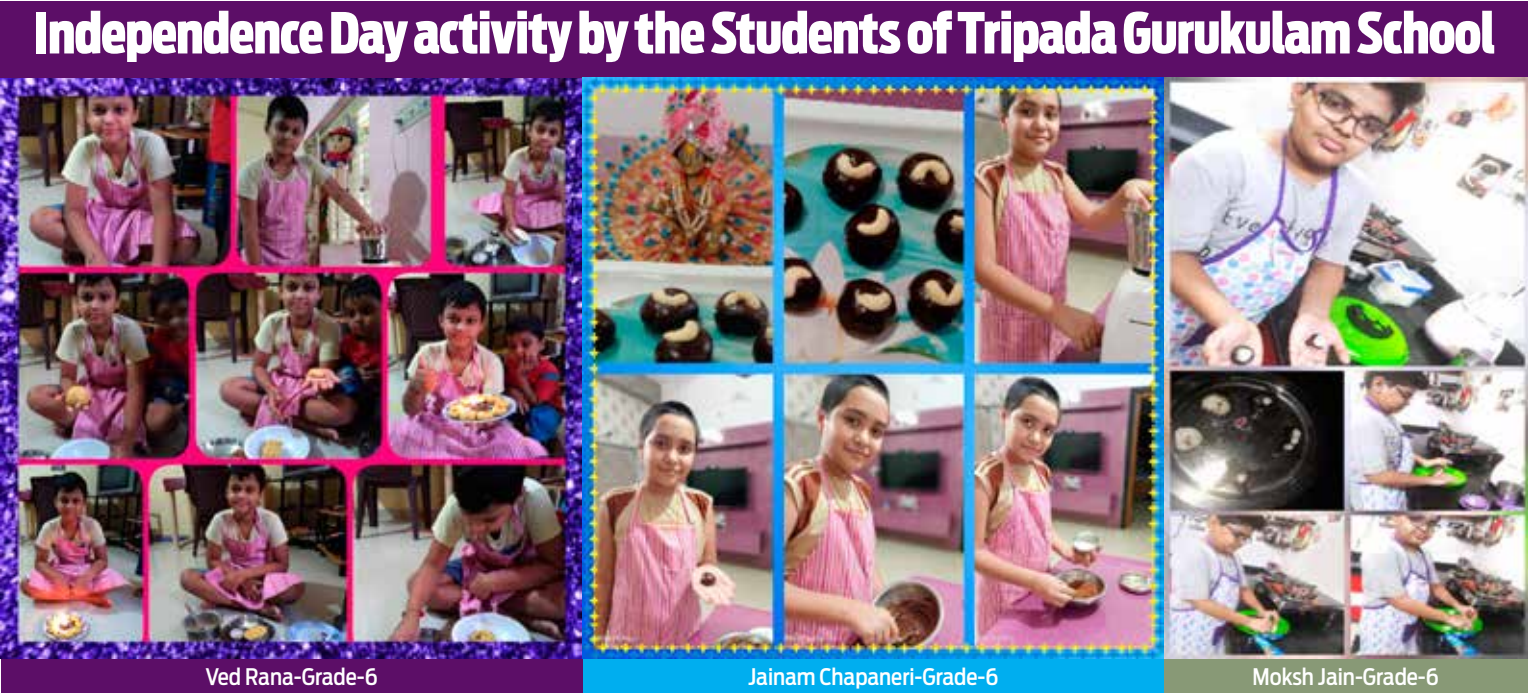

Roasted Turkey and Basil Cream Cheese Pinwheel Sandwiches

Ingredients

- 1 large head romaine lettuce
- 4 ounces whipped cream cheese
- 1 cup baby spinach leaves, loosely packed
- 8 large fresh basil leaves
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Four 10-inch flour tortillas
- 8 slices oven-roasted deli turkey (about 8 ounces)
- 1 whole roasted pepper from a jar, sliced into 1/4-inch strips (about 1/2 cup)
- 1 cup shredded carrots

Directions

1. Pull the largest four romaine leaves from the outside of the bunch and wash and dry carefully, trying not to tear the leaves. Cut the leaves at the base where they were connected to the root; the pieces should be about 9-inches long. Using a vegetable peeler, shave the center rib so the leaves roll up more easily. Set aside.
2. Combine the cream cheese, spinach and basil in a food processor and puree until smooth. Season with 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt and a few grinds of pepper.
3. Lay one of the tortillas on a clean work surface and add one of the romaine leaves to fit neatly on top. Place 2



slices of turkey next to each other, covering the lettuce. Spread 2 tablespoons of the cream cheese mixture over the surface of the turkey and line up a quarter of the roasted pepper strips along one edge. Line up 1/4 cup of the shredded carrot just above the peppers. Roll up the wrap tightly starting from the edge with the peppers and carrots, so the wrap holds together with the peppers and carrots in the middle. Place the wrap seam-side down. Repeat with the remaining tortillas, vegetables, turkey and cream cheese spread. Cut the wraps into 1-inch pieces, then pierce each segment with a toothpick or skewer from the outside of the tortilla through the seam on the bottom.

ZUCCHINI TART

Ingredients

- 1 round store-bought refrigerated pie dough
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 2 medium zucchini, thinly sliced into rounds
- 1 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Extra-virgin olive oil, for drizzling

Directions

1. Put a baking sheet in the oven and preheat the oven to 375 degrees F.

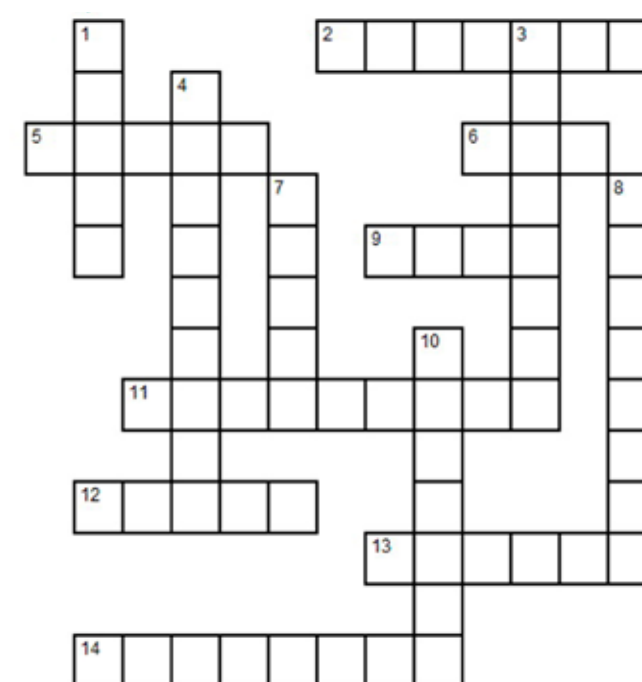


2. Lay the pie dough on a piece of parchment. Slightly raise the edges and crimp. Stir together the mayonnaise and mustard in a small bowl, then spread the mixture over the crust.
3. Put the zucchini and thyme in a medium bowl. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and drizzle with extra-virgin olive oil; toss gently to combine. Arrange the slices over the mayonnaise mixture.
4. Carefully remove the hot pan from the oven. Slide the parchment paper onto the pan and bake until the crust is golden and the zucchini is tender, 20 to 30 minutes.

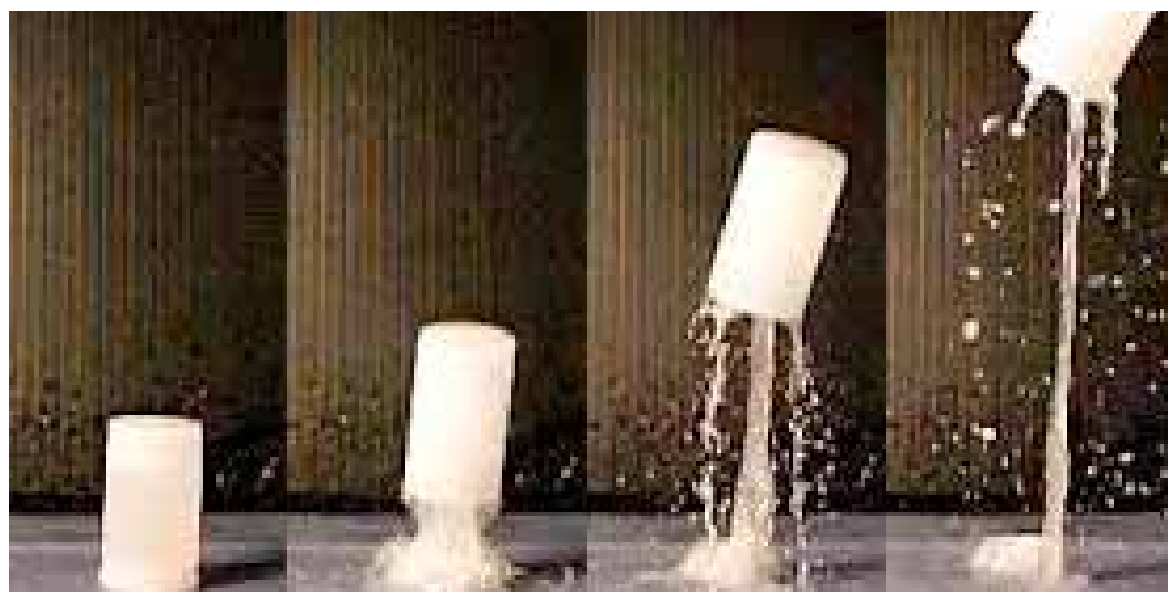

Build a film canister rocket



You will need

- One empty 35mm plastic film canister and lid. These are getting harder to find, but stores that develop film should have some. (The white canisters work much better than the black ones do.) If you have trouble finding canisters, you can get them [HERE](#).
- One fizzing antacid tablet (such as Alka-Seltzer – Get this from your parents)
- Water
- Safety goggles

What to do

1. Put on those safety goggles and head outside – no really, when this works, that film canister really flies! If you want to try the indoor version, do not turn the canister upside down in step 5.
2. Break the antacid tablet in half.
3. Remove the lid from the film canister and put a teaspoon (5 ml) of water into the canister.
4. Drop the tablet half into the canister and snap the cap onto the canister (make sure that it snaps on tightly.)
5. Quickly put the canister on the ground CAP SIDE DOWN and STEP BACK at least 2 meters.
6. About 10 seconds later, you will hear a POP! and the film canister will launch into the air!

Caution

- If it does not launch, wait at least 30 second before examining the canister. Usually the cap is not on tight enough and the build up of gas leaked out.

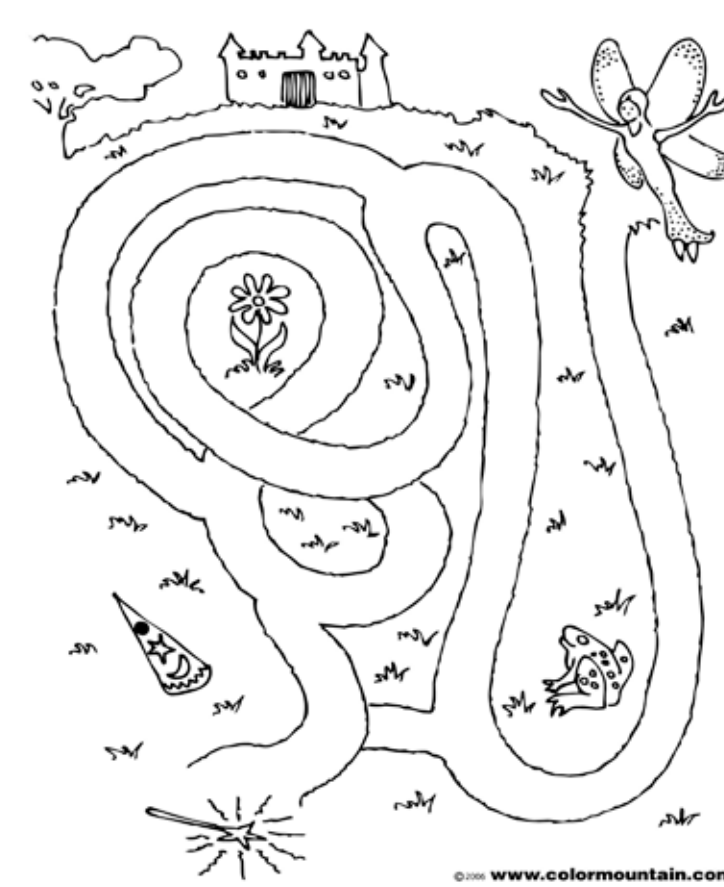

SRI KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI

When was Sri Krishna born?

Janmashtami is the birth date of Lord Krishna—the day he made his earthly appearance. According to mythological texts, Shri Krishna was born in the month of BHadrapad, on the eight day of the dark fortnight. And if this day coincides with the Rohini Nakshatra, then it is considered even luckier and that year, this day is

from Krishna's life.

Many customs have developed in the different parts of India, all based on stories from Krishna's life. For instance, it is said that as a boy, Krishna loved butter and milk so much that they had to be kept out of his reach. This story is reflected in many climbing games for children.

■ In Tamil Nadu, oiled poles with pots of money tied to the top are set up. Boys dressed as Krishna then try to climb these poles to get the money while onlookers squirt water at them.

■ In Maharashtra, where the festival is known as Govinda, pots con-

taining buttermilk are suspended high over streets. Teams of boys then form human pyramids competing against each other to see who can break the most pots.

As an adult, he is most commonly depicted as a dancer or a lover, often playing the flute and surrounded by adoring women. In one story, it is said that defeated the many headed serpent Kaliya by dancing it into submission.

Though not a public holiday, in Fiji, the festival is called as 'Krishna Ashtami' and the celebrations last for eight days culminating on Lord Krishna's birthday. During those eight days, Hindus in Fiji gather at Temples or at their homes with devotional groups and celebrate by singing songs, dancing, reciting prayers and distributing the Prasadam.

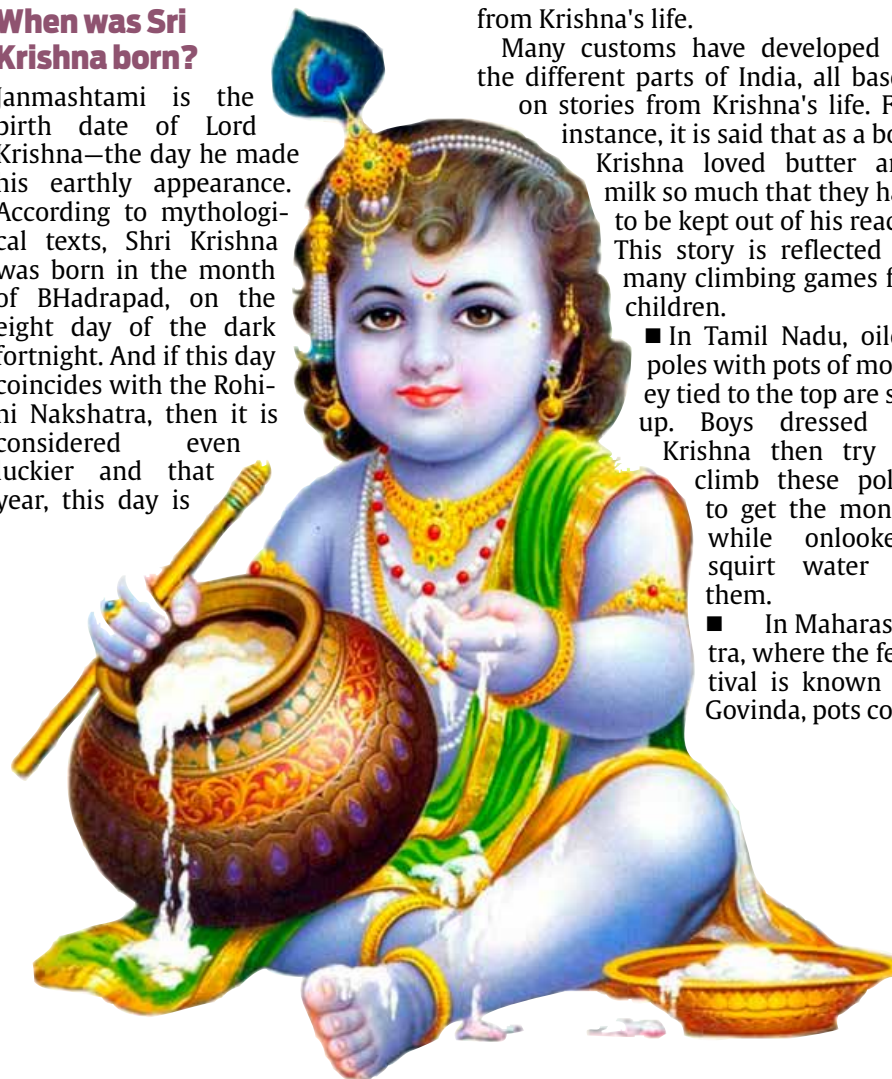
Krishna was born to Devaki and Vasudev in a prison in Mathura. To save the baby from getting killed by his maternal uncle, he was taken across the river to Vrindavan, by his father where he was brought up by Yasoda and Nanda, a cowherd.

History and Background of Janmashtami

This is one of the most important Hindu festivals, Janmashtami (Krishna Jayanti) is the birthday of Lord Krishna, the eighth re-incarnation of Lord Vishnu who gave the vital message of the Bhagwat Gita - the guiding principles for every Hindu.

Across India there will be ceremonies and prayers at temples dedicated to Krishna. The day before may consist of fasting and prayer up to midnight, the time at which it was said that Krishna was born.

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When is Janmashtami?

Janmashtami is a Hindu festival and a Gazetted holiday in many regions of India.

It may be known as Gokulashtami or Sree Krishna Jayanthi in some regions. According to the Hindu calendar, Janmashtami is celebrated on the Ashtami (eighth day) of Krishna Paksha (dark fortnight) in the month of Shravana or Bhadra (in the Hindu calendar, there is a leap month once every three years).

In India, is a Gazetted holiday in Bihar, Chandigarh, Chattisgarh, Delhi, Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu and Kashmir, Jharkhand, Mizoram, Madhya Pradesh, Nagaland, Orissa, Punjab, Rajasthan, Sikkim, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand. In Tamil Nadu this holiday is known as Sri Krishna Jayanti.



In Hindu mythology, the 8th incarnation of Vishnu, Sri Krishna, is the only one who appears in different colors in every stage of his earthly life. As a child he was mischievous and his childhood was full of pranks and fun. Some worship Krishna as the ideal child of innocence. In his youth, he was the most romantic lover and wooed young girls with his flute. The girls were devoted to him and Radha was his greatest devotee. He was a compassionate king and cared for the poor. He was a loyal and trusted friend. He was skilled in war and counseled his friend, Arjuna, on the battle field of Kurukshetra, giving the world the greatest scripture-Bhagwad Gita, which is read worldwide.

Just before the war, Arjuna had a dialogue with Krishna, in which Krishna had explained how an aspiring seeker might seek union with God. This formed the basis of Bhagwad Gita, which till date, when studied, comes forth every time with new meaning. Unlike the other scriptures of the past, The Gita did not teach world renunciation, but instead encouraged world acceptance.

There are many exciting stories about Sri Krishna from his birth to his death. Those who believe in the Hindu faith and in Sri Krishna, celebrate their adorable God's birthday in the form of Janmashtami. On this day, devotees pray and keep a fast to obtain the grace of Lord Krishna. It is one of the biggest religious festivals in India.

16 August - Bennington Battle Day



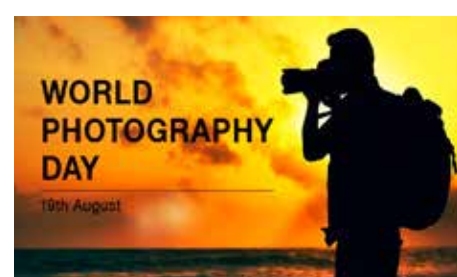
Bennington Battle Day is observed on 16 August annually to honour the Battle of Bennington which took place on 16 August, 1777.

26 August - Women's Equality Day



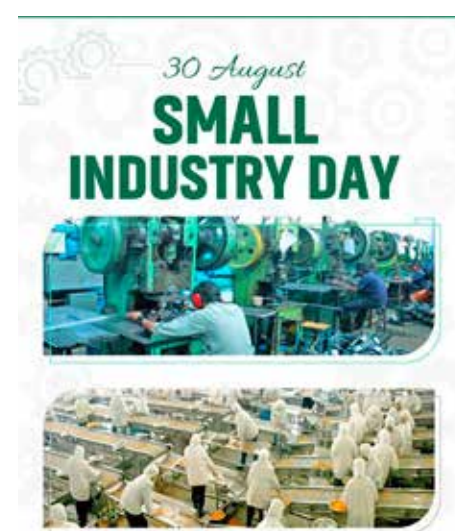

MS Dhoni may get a permanent seat at Wankhede Stadium

The image of Indian cricket's most famous shot, Mahendra Singh Dhoni's 2011 World Cup-winning heave over long on, started doing the rounds on social media on Saturday. It's a shot that has become a synonym for everything Dhoni has achieved, and a testament to his captaincy that saw the country win both the 20-over (2007) and 50-over World Cups.

Though the temporary frenzy online was brought by the 39-year-old announcing his retirement from international cricket, there is a plan on the table for a permanent dedication to his achievement after it was proposed to mark the seat in the Wankhede Stadium where his famous six landed.

Mumbai Cricket Association (MCA) Apex Council member Ajinkya Naik on Monday wrote a letter to the MCA with the proposal, just two days after Dhoni announced the end of an international career that lasted nearly 16 years, and included 90 Tests, 350 ODIs and 98 T20 Internationals. "As an act of gratitude and tribute to Mahendra Singh Dhoni's immense contribution to Indian cricket, the MCA can devote a permanent seat on his name at the stand where his famous World Cup-winning six had landed," read Naik's letter, which has been accessed by The Indian Express. "We can find out the area where the ball landed – and which seat it was flying to – after

Dhoni smashed it to win the 2011 World Cup."

It's the first time there has been an offer for a specific seat in a stadium, and not an entire stand, to be named after a player in India. Abroad, however, the idea has been implemented a few times.

In 1993, at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, a seat in the Great Southern Stand has been painted yellow to commemorate Simon O'Donnell's 122-metre six for Victoria over New South Wales. In 2018, the Etihad Stadium in Melbourne painted a third-tier seat red to honour Big Bash League franchise Melbourne Renegades' Brad Hodge, who hit a 96-metre six in what was his last match before retiring.

Elsewhere, at Eden Park in Auckland, New Zealand Cricket decided to honour former all-rounder Grand Elliot by naming a seat after him. Elliot hit a six off South African Dale Steyn's bowling which secured New Zealand's first-ever spot in final of a World Cup back in 2015. The plaque that was placed on the seat where the ball landed stated: "Here Lies the Resting Place of Grant Elliott's Mighty Six That Propelled the Blackcaps on March 24, 2015, into their maiden World Cup Final."

Similar to how Elliot's effort was honoured, a plan has been put in motion to celebrate Dhoni's hit.

In the summit clash of the World Cup



nine years ago, Dhoni sealed India's triumph with a six off Sri Lankan pacer Nuwan Kulasekara's bowling. The ball landed in the MCA Pavilion. "We can paint and decorate the seat in a unique way to celebrate Dhoni's association with historical Wankhede Stadium in Indian cricket history," Naik's letter said. "The seat could also be used as a major tourist attraction, like a paid tour of the stadium perhaps. It will allow the fans to relive the most glorious moment in Indian cricket and it will be part of MCA's heritage. We can have a plaque on that seat with some special text to honour that moment."

The MCA Apex Council is scheduled to meet on Tuesday and it is likely that Naik's proposal will be discussed. He also went further to suggest finding the World Cup ball that was used in the 2011 final, which can be preserved in the MCA's planned museum. "It would also be nice if possible to find out where that World Cup ball is," he added in the letter. "It can be a proud attraction in the upcoming cricket museum. Here is a small suggestion from me to honour the legendary MS Dhoni."

So far, the Wankhede Stadium has dedicated a few areas to former players. There is the Sachin Tendulkar Stand, the Sunil Gavaskar Stand, and Vijay Merchant Stand. There's also the Polly Umrigar Gate and Vinoo Mankad Gate.

PSG, RB Leipzig seek maiden UEFA Champions League final appearance

The similarities between Paris Saint-Germain and Leipzig end with both clubs trying to reach the Champions League final for the first time.

The French powerhouse will head into Tuesday's semifinal match with its Qatari money and high-profile squad, while the German club comes with its Red Bull backing and a team of mostly untested players.

At the Stadium of Light in Lisbon, it will be Neymar, Kylian Mbappe, and his teammates taking on a Leipzig squad with little Champions League experience.

Leipzig has almost nothing to lose. For PSG, anything short of the title will feel like a disappointment for a club where a priority aim has been to break through with the European title after years of dominance in France.

PSG became a European contender under its Qatari owners, but Leipzig is just starting to try to make its mark in Europe under energy drink company Red Bull, which in 2009 bought the license rights from the fifth-tier club SSV



Markranstaedt and financed the new team's steady promotion through the lower leagues.

Leipzig reached the Bundesliga in 2016 and the Champions League a few years later, but it has become highly unpopular at home because of its fast rise financed by Red Bull, prompting rivals fans to often protest at games.

In its second Champions League appearance, the German club eliminated Tottenham in the round of 16 and Atletico Madrid in the quarterfinals. PSG, managed by German coach Thomas Tuchel, got past Borussia Dortmund in the last 16 and Atalanta in the quarterfinals.

PSG enters the semifinals with the feeling that this finally could be the time it triumphs in Europe.

"We have a very capable team," said defender Marquinhos, who scored one of the goals against Atalanta. "Not only the first team players but at the moment our squad is much stronger compared to previous seasons."

PSG was eliminated in the last-16 in the last three seasons, and in the quarterfinals four straight times before that. Its last semifinal appearance was 25 years ago when it lost to AC Milan.

"We don't talk about history, we live at the moment," Tuchel said.

"We are here because we played a great Champions League season. If it's a historic moment, it's because we

worked very hard for many, many months. We are hungry for success and we are here to win and to make all that hard work pay off. We can't control the result but we will fight until the end."

PSG will again be led by the Red Bull-sponsored Neymar, who was signed to try to help the club make the leap and clinch the European title. On Tuesday, he is expected to have the full support from Mbappe and Angel Di Maria.

Mbappe couldn't play the entire match against Atalanta because he was returning from injury, while Di Maria was suspended.

Goalkeeper Keylor Navas, who had to be replaced against Atalanta because of a right leg muscle injury, was listed as doubtful. Veteran defender Thiago Silva was expected to play after tests showed only a low-grade tear in his right hamstring.

It is unclear if American player Tyler Adams, who scored Leipzig's late winner over Atletico Madrid, will be on the bench again or will make the starting lineup.

US election: Michelle Obama says vote for Joe Biden like your lives depends on it



Former first lady Michelle Obama launched a scathing attack on President Donald Trump on the first night of the Democratic National Convention on Monday, calling him the "wrong president" for the country and urging Americans to elect Joe Biden in November to end the chaos created by Trump's presidency. While acknowledging she did not care much for politics, Obama said Biden's steady and empathetic approach to problems was the answer and urged voters to stand in line or do whatever it takes to ensure they can beat Trump.

Delhi Metro starts casting work of U-girders for Aerocity-Tughlakabad corridor



The Delhi Metro commenced the casting work of U-girders which would be installed on 4.2-km elevated section of the Aerocity-Tughlakabad corridor under its Phase-IV project, officials said. This stretch includes construction of four elevated stations, namely, Sangam Vihar, Khanpur-Devoli, Ambedkar Nagar and Saket-G, on the 22 km-long corridor. "The Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) today commenced the casting work of U-girders which would be installed on 4.2-km elevated section of the Aerocity-Tughlakabad corridor under Phase-IV,"

Sabrina Singh makes 1st Indian-American press secretary to US VP nominee. Who is Sabrina?



Senator Kamala Harris appointed Indian-American Sabrina Singh as the press secretary for her Democratic vice presidential campaign. If Harris made the first woman of African and Indian descent to make it to the presidential ticket in the US, then Sabrina Singh became the first-ever Indian-American press secretary to a vice-presidential nominee of a major political party. A young achiever, 33-year old Sabrina previously was the spokeswoman of two Democratic presidential candidates and headed the press shop of two Democratic presidential candidates -- New Jersey Senator Cory Booker and former New York mayor Mike Bloomberg.

Indian foreign secretary set to visit Bangladesh to boost ties



Indian Foreign Secretary, Harsh V Shringla, will be on a day-long visit to Bangladesh's Dhaka to boost ties between the two countries. The visit comes at a time when both the sides have started year-long celebrations of 'Mujib Barsho' and 50 years of liberation struggle of Bangladesh. During the visit, Harsh V Shringla would be calling on Bangladeshi Prime Minister, Sheikh Hasina, and Foreign Minister, Abdul Momen, and would hold bilateral meetings with his counterpart, Foreign Secretary, Masud bin Momen.

China grants country's first coronavirus vaccine patent to CanSino



China's vaccine specialist CanSino Biologics Inc has won a patent approval from Beijing for its COVID-19 vaccine candidate Ad5-nCoV, state media reported, citing documents from the country's intellectual property regulator. It is the first COVID-19 vaccine patent granted by China, state-owned newspaper People's Daily reported on Sunday. The paper cited documents published by China's National Intellectual Property Administration saying that the patent was issued. Saudi Arabia said this month it plans to begin Phase III clinical trials for the CanSino vaccine. CanSino has said it is also in talks with Russia, Brazil and Chile to launch Phase III trials in those countries.

YSRCP refutes TDP chief's phone tapping charges



The YSR Congress Party on Monday refuted the Opposition's allegations of phone tapping and claimed that Telugu Desam Party chief Chandrababu Naidu was trying to make an issue out of a non-issue. The ruling party categorically stated that there was no reason for the state government to tap phones. Chandrababu Naidu had wrote to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, alleging that the phones of opposition leaders were illegally being tapped by the YS Jagan Mohan Reddy government in the state.

China blasts US 'digital gunboat diplomacy' over TikTok



China on slammed Washington for using "digital gunboat diplomacy" after US President Donald Trump ordered TikTok's Chinese owner ByteDance to sell its interest in the Musical.ly app it bought and merged with TikTok. As tensions soar between the world's two biggest economies, Trump has claimed TikTok could be used by China to track the locations of federal employees, build dossiers on people for blackmail, and conduct corporate espionage. The order issued late Friday builds on sweeping restrictions issued by Trump that TikTok and WeChat end all operations in the US.

Hyderabad airport resumes direct flight ops to UK under 'air transport bubbles'



The Rajiv Gandhi International Airport in Hyderabad has resumed its flight operations with Heathrow Airport in London, under the Government of India's 'air transport bubbles' with other countries. The government had created 'transport bubbles' with the United States, France and Germany earlier this week. In addition to Indian carriers, carriers from all the countries coming under this 'bubble' arrangement are now permitted to operate services between India and their respective countries. With flight operations resuming between Hyderabad and London, the first flight of British Airways (BA 276), a Boeing 787-9 Dreamliner wide-bodied aircraft with passengers on board, took off from Hyderabad Airport around 7.50 a.m.
